USES:	Containers, mass planting, low water

MEDIA:	Standard Ornamental Nursery Mix
MEDIA PH:	5.5–6.5
MEDIA EC:	1.0–1.5
MOISTURE:	Maintain even moisture in well-drained soil. Be sure to use a highly porous, well-draining potting soil. Plants do not like excessive water.
FERTILIZER:	13-5-9 Harrell's 8–9 month slow release feed, top dressed <ul style="list-style-type: none">• 20 grams in 1 gallon• 40 grams in 2 gallon• 60 grams in 3 gallon
COMMON PESTS & DISEASE:	No serious pest or disease problems.
TRIMMING:	A minimum of 1 trim is recommended for best finish in all sizes.
PGRS:	None needed
FINISHING TIMES:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• <i>1 gallon:</i> Plant 1 – 72c per container in spring, plants will finish in about 8 weeks.
